

During the recent school closures, your EAL learners may have experienced a significant lack of exposure to English language models. This also includes lack of exposure to extended reading, listening and speaking opportunities. These opportunities are key to ensuring that your learners progress in their English language proficiency, which in turn allows them access to the curriculum. To help with this, The Bell Foundation has compiled a list of resources below which provide exposure to extended reading, listening (and where possible) speaking resources. Some resources are curriculum-focussed, whereas others are language-focussed. We hope these resources are helpful for your learners.
